Emphasize collaboration within your team and showcase how interdisciplinary integration influenced your design decisions. Highlight the seamless blend of architectural, landscape, sustainability, urban planning, business, engineering, and construction management elements in your presentation.

Prepare to present your digital slide deck to a panel of judges. Ensure clarity and coherence in your verbal presentation to complement the visual content. Teams are solely responsible for designs that address the competition prompt and criteria.

Demonstrate individual and collective accountability for the presented concepts.



- What challenges may arise in developing this project? How might you answer those challenges?
 - What kind of delays might arise in the project schedule?
